Education Assistance Program

A major member benefit for Alaskan Scottish Club members is Club's Educational Assistance Program. Individuals and groups are now eligible to apply for grants of up to \$500 to hold or attend schools or workshops involving activities that encourage and assist in the understanding and appreciation of Scottish lore in music, sports, dancing, traditions, heritage, literature and art.

Up to \$1,500 grants are also available for post-secondary education at an Alaskan post-secondary education institution.

To apply for a grant, the applicant must submit an application (available on the club website) at least 30 days in advance of the planned activity. The applications are then evaluated by the Educational Assistance committee, who make recommendations to the board for approval.

After attendance at the school or program, the applicant may be asked to share what they've learned by means of a performance, talk, or short (one-page) written report.


The Alaskan Scottish Club has a long history of celebrating St. Andrew's Night. Here is a short history of the event as it is celebrated in Scotland:

The feast day of Scotland's patron saint, Saint Andrew, falls just before the real flurry of Christmas excitement sets in, on 30th November. Similar to Christmas Day in Scotland, the traditional St Andrew's Day celebration was only relatively recently given national holiday status, with it also being set as an official 'flag day', giving the country an opportunity to fly the Saltire in patriotic fashion. It's also a good excuse to annually revere in the more high energy Scotland's elements of culture, with dinner parties, ceilidhs, music and other celebratory events all taking place around the evening of the 30th.

The ASC celebrates with a ceilidh, usually on the Saturday after Thanksgiving. We generally include live music (including piping) and a Christmas-themed silent auction. Stay tuned for more details as the date approaches.

Samhain: Celebrate the Celtic New Year



The third harvest festival of the Celtic year is Samhain, which is also the Celtic New Year. Each year, the Celtic Community of Alaska hosts a Samhain celebration, which the Scottish Club proudly sponsors.

Recipe of the Month:

Celebrate the Harvest: Mabon

Mabon is the second harvest celebration on the Celtic Wheel of the year, and is celebrated on the autumnal equinox, September 22. Your Mabon feast might include squash (or, in America, pumpkin), apples, root vegetables, berries, fresh fish or game. Below is a recipe from the Dyke Primary School cookbook, *Dykes Delights*, used with permission of the authors.

SCRUMMY SQUASH SOUP

Ingredients:

2 oz butter

1 medium onion, diced

1 tsp cumin seeds

1 squash, chopped (approx)

7 oz potatoes, chopped

1 pint chicken or vegetable stock

Salt & pepper

Method:

- 1. Heat butter and cook the onion until soft.
- 2. Add cumin and stir for 1 minute.
- 3. Add the squash and the potatoes, cook for 1 minute.
- 4. Add stock and seasoning.
- 5. Cover and simmer for 25 minutes.
- 6. Cool and season to taste.
- 7. Puree in blender

Baked Apples

This recipe is from Celtic Folklore Cooking by Joanne Asala. When you core the apple, don't cut all the way through – that way the filling and sauce will stay in the apple!

Ingredients:

6 large apples

3/4 cup fruit and nut mixture (currant or raisons, chopped nuts, lemon rind, etc.)

½ cup dark brown sugar, packed

½ cup water

1 tablespoon butter

½ teaspoon cinnamon1/2 teaspoon nutmeg

Whipped cream

Method:

- Core the apples and place in a baking dish large enough to accommodate the apples without them touching.
- 2. Fill the apples with the fruit and nut mixture
- In a small saucepan, combine the brown sugar, water, butter and spices. Bring to a boil, and pour into and around the apples.
- 4. Bake, uncovered, for 1 hour at 350 degrees. Baste occasionally with sugar mixture. They will be done when they are fluffy and slightly burst.
- 5. Serve with whipped cream.

- Though Scotland is a part of the United Kingdom of the Great Britain, its legal system is still separate from that of England, Northern Ireland, and Wales.
- Scots law, derived from the Roman law, consists of both civil law and common law.
- The unique legal system of Scotland consists of three verdicts: guilty, not guilty, and not proven.
 There is no retrial for not guilty and not proven, and they also result in acquittal.

Clan Stewart

The Stewarts and their supporters can be found in every aspect of Scottish history. Known as "The Protectors" the name in one of its many versions is the most common surname in modern Scotland.

The Stewarts are not a clan in the usual sense (though there were Highland branches, principally the Stewarts of Appin), nor are they a family. The origin of the Stewart structure was Alan fitz Faald. the Celtic Breton, who came to Britain with or shortly after William the Conqueror. Two of his sons entered the service of David I of Scotland, and one of them, Walter fitz Alan, became Hereditary High Steward of Scotland. Thus, the family name originates in an occupation, like so many others.

At least eight variations of the name are known. One common spelling, Stuart, is incorrectly assumed to be "royal." This spelling is the result of many Stewarts who lived in France either due to exile or choice during the struggles for succession to the throne with both the Tudors at the beginning of their dynasty on the British throne and with the Hanovers during the Jacobite rebellions at the end. These Stewarts adopted the French spelling and there is no "w" in the French or Gaelic alphabet.

At one time or another, Stewarts have held dukedoms, at least 17 earldoms, scores of other noble positions, and have been identified with more than 160 Scottish localities. Among the major branches that developed across the expanse of Scotland were Stuart of Bute and the Stewarts of Galloway, Appin and Atholl. The Stewarts of Appin were strong supporters of the Jacobite rebellion to the very end on the moors of Culloden.



Many families and towns affiliated with the Stewarts for fame, fortune, or protection. So many other tradesmen associated with the Stewart family that it is also known as the Clan of Tinkers and Kings.

Our Policy on this says that we can award \$500.00 to an individual and we can also award a grant for additional funds. Ron moved that the Education Assistance Program Committee approve a \$500.00 grant to Jeni for this event, as well as a one-time only grant not to exceed \$1000.00 to help cover Jeni's expenses to attend this event. Meg seconded the motion. Motion passed.
